Note: All parents/students are cautioned to carefully read the following rules and regulations. Rules will be strictly enforced.

General Provisions:

The Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association reserves, to its Rules Committee, the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations as set forth and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences, in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of, in connection with, or incident to the show.

The LSA Rules Committee reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as it, in its judgment, may deem advisable.

In consideration for the opportunity to participate in the show, each student and the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) agree to abide by the general rules and special rules, as published herein. Any student or the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) who violate and/or refuse to follow any of the general rules and/or special rules, as published, will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.

Students will abide by all school rules and be subject to disciplinary action for any misbehavior according to regular school policy. In extreme cases of misbehavior, the student's project will be removed and will not be allowed to be shown or sold.

Following the procedures to purchase, enter, and raise an animal for the CFISD Livestock Show does not guarantee eligibility to participate in the show or sale. As noted in the rules and regulations, students understand that they must be eligible to compete at the livestock show based on UIL and Cypress-Fairbanks ISD guidelines. Ineligibility to compete may result from failing grades and/or placement at an alternative learning campus. In the event a student is ineligible to compete, their project will not be allowed on the show grounds to participate in the show or sale and their project-related expenses are non-refundable.

The LSA Governing Committee has approved the following rules and regulations for the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association, based on recommendations of the LSA Rules Committee:

1. Dates and Location	The Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show will be held February 6-8, 2020, at the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Exhibit Center on Telge Road.
2. Liability	The Cypress-Fairbanks ISD, Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association, Executive Board of Directors, Executive Committee, Committeemen, etc., will not be liable for any personal injuries, damages, fire, theft, accident; any matters resulting from or relating to unattended animals/projects; forfeiture of all awards and/or sale proceeds; non-payment of sale proceeds by buyer(s), etc.
3. Conduct	No type of misconduct by the student, the student's parent(s), legal guardian(s), or guest(s) will be tolerated (including, but not limited to disrespect, profanity, use of tobacco products, insubordination, excessive horseplay, etc.). This is a school-sponsored event, so the Code of Conduct must be followed. This type of behavior can result in the disqualification of any project from the premium, freezer, or silent auction sales and immediate removal of project(s), student(s), parent(s), legal guardian(s), and/or guest(s) from the show facilities.
4. Project acquisition/ production, housing, supervision	Animal acquisition The student must be the owner of the animal to participate in the livestock show. Family members may not share projects with the exception of poultry and rabbits.
	All animals, except rabbits and heifers, will be purchased from a supplier selected by the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association's Rules Committee and paid for by School Cash Online, money order, cashier's check, or with cash. Money orders and cashier's checks must be made payable to the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD (or CFISD). CFISD will consolidate these monies into one form of payment to the suppliers as a convenience to supplier, parents and students of CFISD. Students must adhere to the schedule/ deadlines, included in this rule book, for entry and validation of animal projects for the livestock show.
	Housing animal projects Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the student to find and secure housing for their CFISD animal project(s). Students may apply for space at a CFISD AgScience Center or at their campus FFA Booster Club facility if one exists. Submitting an application does not guarantee space will be available. Each type of facility (CFISD or Booster Club) has a separate process for requesting space, therefore acquiring permission to house an animal at one facility does not guarantee that permission will automatically be transferred to another facility if circumstances change. Consequences for violations at one center will be honored and enforced at all centers (including both District- and Booster Club-run facilities). 	Projects raised/produced on private property Students must raise/produce projects within a 20-mile radius of Cypress-Fairbanks ISD boundaries, unless the student lives on the premises where the animal is kept or project is built. (Example: The student is the child of an employee of Cypress-Fairbanks ISD who lives out-of-district.) Students/parents with projects raised/produced on private property must provide the ag teacher access to the project/property (for supervision purposes) at least one time per month. Failure to do so may result in the project being disqualified.

4. Project acquisition/ Teacher supervision requirements Projects entered in the CFISD Livestock Show satisfy, in part, the supervised agriculture experience (SAE) that is required by the state production, housing, for every student taking an ag class. Teacher supervision and student documentation (record book) of the SAE is required. Ag teachers supervision will provide general SAE guidance to students in the classroom on a regular basis. They will provide specific SAE feedback at least six (continued) (6) times per school year, with at least one (1) time occurring during any given grading period. For short-term projects, the goal is monthly feedback. 5. DNA Testing The purpose of DNA testing is to support the validity of ownership of the animal in case a question of ownership arises. An initial hair sample will be collected from each animal (steer, lamb, goat, swine) at the time of the selection process. The hair samples will be sealed in a tamper-proof envelope identified by the animal's ear tag number. The hair sample collection process will be facilitated by a veterinarian, vet tech, or their designee. The initial hair samples will be stored in the CTE office at ISC under the supervision of the CTE Coordinator for Agricultural Science. The top two placing animals from each weight class in the steer, lamb, goat, and swine divisions will be subject to a comparative DNA test. Using a process similar to the one used to collect the initial hair sample, upon leaving the competition arena area, the 1st and 2nd place winners will be led to a location where a second hair sample will be collected. This sample may then be taken to a lab, along with the initial sample, for a DNA comparison test. The CFISD Livestock Show Association Rules Committee reserves to the right to initiate a DNA comparison test on any animal in the steer, lamb, goat, and swine divisions if ownership is in question (i.e. when an ear tag is lost or there is a question of tampering). If someone outside of the CFISD Livestock Show Association Rules Committee wishes to submit a protest of ownership, it must be made with specific reasoning in writing, along with \$250 cash, to the CFISD Livestock Show Association. The protest will be reviewed and considered by the CFISD Livestock Show Association Rules Committee. If the protest is accepted, the \$250 (cash) collected from the person protesting will be used, in part, to pay for the DNA testing. The \$250 fee will be refunded if the protest proves to be valid (DNA does not match initial sample). If the owner refuses the collection of the initial DNA sample or a sample to be compared to the initial sample, or if the sample comes back from testing and it does not match the initial DNA sample, the entry is disqualified and the exhibitor forfeits all awards and all sale money (premium, freezer, gifts) collected through the CFISD FFA Livestock Show Association. In addition, any future CFISD Livestock Show entries of this exhibitor are subject to DNA testing. 6. Insurance Cypress-Fairbanks ISD does not provide insurance for animal projects. Once the student takes possession of the animal and leaves the selection area, CFISD nor the CFISD Livestock Show Association is responsible for any expenses related to the health and welfare of the animal. This includes reimbursement of expenses due to illness or death. Students, and parents, are advised to consider purchasing insurance through an outside agency 7. Eligibility to Participate Ag class and FFA membership requirements Only students who are enrolled in at least one semester of agriculture science classes in Cypress-Fairbanks ISD during the 2019-2020 school year and are paid FFA members in good standing according to their chapter constitution will be allowed to exhibit at the CFISD Livestock Show. **UIL/CFISD** eligibility requirements A student must be eligible for participation in extra-curricular activities in accordance with current guidelines of UIL and Cypress-Fairbanks ISD. Ineligibility to compete may result from failing grades and/or placement at an alternative learning campus. The student's campus principal or designee will certify this eligibility. Ineligible projects Projects of students who are ineligible will not be allowed on the show grounds to participate in the show or sale and project-related expenses are non-refundable. Eligibility and group Ag Mechanics projects Group Ag Mechanics projects will be allowed to check in and compete as long as one of the students listed on the entry form for that project is eligible. The names of any ineligible student(s) will be removed and only eligible student(s) will be allowed to receive any awards and/or earn monies if the project is sold. 8. Care/grooming of See Division Rules and Regulations for details on allowable and expected care/grooming. animals 9. Attendance at the Transportation Livestock Show & Sale Students must provide their own transportation to and from the livestock show. Required attendance times During school hours (7:20 am to 2:40 pm), eligible students are considered on a field trip and required to remain at the Exhibit Center. Likewise, ineligible students will not be permitted on show grounds during school hours. There will be no loitering or cooking in the parking lot. Once the Exhibit Center closes each night, it will be off-limits. See the schedule on page 7 for closing times. Students selling projects are required to attend a mandatory sale meeting at 9:00 am on Saturday, February 8, 2020. Students who miss Saturday's meeting will be fined \$75.00. Students selling projects should remain in the Exhibit Center for the duration of the premium sale. Upon completion of the premium sale, agriscience teachers in charge of each division will give students directions on when and how to remove their projects.

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9. Attendance at the Livestock Show & Sale	Substitute show persons Each student is responsible for the care of the student's animal/project(s) throughout the show. The student's agriscience teacher will
Livestock Silow & Sale	select/approve a substitute show person for students with documented special needs or conflicting school activities. Ag teachers will
(continued)	submit documentation for any requests to the CTE Director before the start of the event. Requesting a substitute showman for any other reason must be approved by the CTE Director. Students may only exhibit animal projects from their FFA chapter.
10. Dress	Students shall be in official dress at the time they show their project for judging and during the premium and freezer sale or silent auction.
New for 2019-20	Official dress for female students: black pants (without embellishments) or black skirt (without embellishments), solid black belt (without embellishments other than buckle), white-collared blouse (white shirt buttoned to the top) with official FFA blue scarf, black shoes, black socks or hosiery, and an official FFA jacket zipped to the top. If wearing a skirt, it is to be at least knee length, hemmed evenly across the bottom, with a slit no longer than two inches above the knee, excluding the kick pleat.
2019-20	Official dress for male students: black pants (without embellishments), solid black belt (without embellishments other than buckle), white-collared shirt with official FFA tie/bowtie, black shoes, black socks, and an official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
11. Disqualifications	Sifting The decision to sift an animal will be made by the LSA Rules Committee, or their designated sifter. (See the specific rules for each animal division for the qualities on which an animal may be sifted.) All sifted animals will be marked at the time the animal is disqualified from the show. Sifted animals will be removed from the show grounds by barn closing time on the day the animal is disqualified.
	Unruly animals Wild or unruly animals may be disqualified. The decision to disqualify an unruly animal will be at the discretion of the judge.
	Unethically fitted livestock There will be no showing of unethically fitted livestock. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body before or during the show. Animals showing signs of having been operated on or tampered with, for the purpose of concealing faults in conformation, or with intent to deceive relative to the animal's soundness, will be disqualified by the judge or LSA Rules Committee.
	Protests related to disqualifications All decisions of the LSA Rules Committee and designated sifters related to disqualifications are final and protests will not be considered by the CFISD Livestock Show Association.
12. Dogs	Dogs are not allowed on show grounds because of safety and public health regulations. Exceptions are granted for service dogs that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability. The task(s) performed by the dog must be directly related to the person's disability. The service animal must remain on a leash or otherwise be under the handler's control while on the Show grounds. To protect the health and well-being of all, service dogs may be asked to stay out of the pen/stall areas, especially during times when students are in the aisles with livestock.
13. Fire Marshal/Safety	To stay within guidelines set by safety officials:
Regulations	Tack storage No dedicated tack storage area will be available at the Exhibit Center. Students will need to carry in the few supplies they need. These supplies may be kept in a hanging closed storage container inside the pens/stalls, but not on the floor or in the aisles.
	Electricity usage Each school may have two blow dryers available at the Exhibit Center. Multiple electrical outlets are available for use. Permission is required for use of any extension cords/power strips.
	Chairs and tables To keep aisles/exits clear, exhibitors and guests are only allowed to place chairs in designated areas as determined by the LSA staff. Any chairs should not be large/reclining and should be folded and set aside when not in use. The LSA staff has the authority to remove any unattended chairs. Only tables set up by the LSA are allowed.
14. Judging	See Division Rules and Regulations for more details on procedures for judging.
	Announcements made by the announcer may not be official. No student, parent, legal guardian, agriscience teacher, or any other person shall influence or interfere with the judge's decision. All decisions of the official judges are final and protests will not be considered by the Livestock Show Association.
15. Protests	All formal protests must be filed in writing and accompanied with a \$250.00 (cash) fee. The fee will be refunded if the protest is accepted. If the protest is not accepted, the \$250.00 (cash) fee will be forfeited and deposited in the general livestock show account. A protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the show management immediately after the occasion that prompted the protest. A protest will be accepted prior to judging or immediately at the conclusion of judging. A majority vote of the agriscience teachers present will determine the final decision regarding all protests. In the case of a tie vote, the CTE Administrator for Agricultural Science will make the final decision.
	All decisions of the Rules Committee and judges/sifters are final and protests will not be considered by the Livestock Show Association.
16. Sale	See Sale Rules and Regulations for sale details.



These rules apply to the steer, lamb, goat, and swine divisions.

1. Draw

- a. Draw is defined as the activity in which the student draws their lottery number for the selection of a CFISD animal.
- b. Draw time and place is listed in the LSA Rule Book. Typically the draw will immediately precede the selection if there will be only one heat that day. If the number of animals being selected is large enough to warrant multiple heats, the draw may be scheduled in the days preceding the selection to give students/parents the option to stagger their arrival to select based on their lottery number.
- c. In the event the student is not present, the student's agriscience teacher and/or adult representative will draw for the student. It is the student's responsibility to obtain their draw number from their agriscience teacher in a timely manner.
- d. The draw process will start with a numbered list of students, in alphabetical order, with entries in the division. A number will be drawn (and replaced) and that student will be the first to draw a number. The draw order will then continue through the end of the list of students and then wrap back to the start of the list until all students have drawn. (Example: The #15 is drawn (and replaced). Student #15 is the first to draw a number...then student #16, #17, #18, etc. until we get to the end of the list. Then student #1 draws, followed by #2, #3, #4, etc., with student #14 being the last to draw a number.)
- e. All draw numbers are final.
- f. The student will be given an item with their draw number on the item that must be shown at the time of selection (i.e. key chain with the number).

2. Selector

- a. A selector is defined as any one person who is advising a student on the selection of a CFISD livestock show animal during the student's allotted time. Selectors cannot fall into a category as follows:
- i. Current CFISD agriscience Teacher
- ii. Any student who has not yet selected their same species of animal
- iii. The judge or immediate family member of the judge for the species of the year for which the animal is being selected; or the teaching partner of the judge
- iv. The breeder/supplier, including their family and employees
- b. Selectors are to leave the animal selection area immediately when they are not selecting for a student. In the event that the selector is assisting the student with transporting the animal, the selector may remain with the student in the designated animal holding area.
- c. The breeder/supplier, including their family/employees, is not allowed to advise students nor their selectors on the selection of animals during the selection process.

3. Viewing



- a. Viewing is defined as the time period for the student and one selector to browse all animals in the animal selection area. The length of the viewing period will be based on the number of animals being selected for that species.
 - 150 or fewer animals 30 minute viewing
- 151 or more animals 45 minute viewing for 1st heat, 35 minute viewing for 2nd heat, 25 minute viewing for 3rd heat
- b. Students and selectors may not enter the pens of the animals during this time.
- c. The viewing will be separated into heats based upon the number of animals of the species being viewed. The number of heats and times will be determined by the Agriscience teachers. (Example: If there are 80 lamb entries being selected in two heats, only students #1 #40 will be in the first 30-minute viewing and heat to select. Once the first 40 lambs have been selected, students #41 #80 will be allowed to view the remaining lambs for 30 minutes and select in a second heat.)
- d. Each selection heat will begin shortly after the previous selection heat. If there are more than two heats on one day, a minimum time for the start of one of the later heats will be advertised (i.e. The third heat will start no earlier than _______).
- e. Current CFISD agriscience teachers may advise students and selectors during the viewing time only.

4. Animal Selection Area

- a. The animal selection area is defined as the designated area in which the animals to be selected are located.
- b. CFISD agriscience teachers, CFISD CTE personnel, and the veterinarian (and assistant, if applicable) who is vaccinating are the only people allowed in this area at all times. All others allowed in the selection area are up to the discretion of the agriscience teachers (i.e. student volunteers and reporters who are not selecting an animal, animal breeders).
- c. Students and selectors are allowed in this area only during their viewing and selection time.
- d. The holding area is for students and their animals that have already been selected. The person helping them transport the animal may be in this area as well at the time the animal is in the holding area.

5. Selection Time a	a. Selection time is defined as the time in which a student and a selector are in the animal selection area to select an animal.
1	o. In the event a student has lost their draw item (i.e. key chain) they must have their number written on their hand by their agriscience teacher only.
s _i	c. If a student has a conflict that will prevent him/her from attending on selection day, their ag teacher must be notified ahead of their selection time. The ag teacher may approve a parent or legal guardian listed on the entry form to select for the student. (Special permission from the CFISD Ag Coordinator will be required for a 3rd party to select if both the student and a parent/legal guardian isted on the entry form are unable to attend.)
s E tl ir	d. During selection time, three students and their selectors will be in the selection area at one time. (The number of students in the selection area may be increased to five at the discretion of the agriscience teachers, based on the number of animals being selected.) Each student and their selector are given three minutes to select an animal, based on the order of their lottery number. During these three (3) minutes, the student and selector must stay together and may go into the pens of the animals. The other students/selectors in the selection area may view the animals until their designated 3-minute selection time. i. For example, once the thirty (30) minute viewing time is over, students #1, #2, #3 and their selectors will be let in the selection area. Time will start for student #1he/she will be given 3 minutes to go into the pens of the animals and make a selection. ii. Once student #1 makes a selection, time will start for student #2he/she will be given 3 minutes to go into the pens of the animals and make a selection, time will start for student #3he/she will be given 3 minutes to go into the pens of the animals and make a selectionand student #4 (and selector) will be allowed to enter the selection area. iii. Once student #2 makes a selection, time will start for student #3he/she will be given 3 minutes to go into the pens of the animals and make a selectionand student #5 (and selector) will be allowed to enter the selection area. iv. This process will continue until all students in the heat have selected. v. If the number of animals being selected warrants more than one heat, the next heat will start with a 30 minute viewing session (as described in the beginning of this section) and proceed from there. E. A CFISD agriscience teacher is not allowed to advise a student and/or their selector on the selection. The student will then the selection time. 6. Vaccinations/DNA a	a. After a lamb, goat, or swine has been selected, the student must remain with the animal during the vaccination and removal of hair

	a. Once the animal has been vaccinated and hair has been removed for DNA verification, the student is to take the animal to a designated holding pen or immediately transport the animal to its new location.
b	o. All animals in holding pens should be in the process of being removed at the conclusion of the selection.
l l	c. All animals are selected —as is, meaning the student/parent are solely responsible for the welfare of the animal from the time it eaves the selection area.

DRUG RESIDUE RULES

26TH ANNUAL LIVESTOCK SHOW

- 1. Drug residue testing: Exhibitors and parents/guardians consent and agree that any market entries may, at the discretion of the Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District Livestock Show Association, be tested for unauthorized use of medications or drugs. They further certify that they will not administer their market entry with any substance not approved by the FDA and/or USDA for this species. (For example, they will not give a substance labeled as swine feed supplement to poultry.) Their entry is not, nor will it be, within any withdrawal time relative to the administration of any drug, chemical, or feed additive approved by the FDA and/or USDA by the time the animal(s) is officially checked-in by the Association. As condition for participation in the show, every exhibitor must agree to submit their animal(s) for testing at any time after check-in. The Association reserves the right to perform any test, including but not limited to tissue, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis, on the grand and reserve champions, along with a random group of animals from each division. If rabbits are involved in a urine test and the rabbits don't provide a sample within 2 hours, the parents/students may approve of an alternate method of testing, if one is available. The exhibitor and his/her parent/guardian must be present during the collection for testing and must witness the sample; thus verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis. The Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either alive or dead, found in violation of the use of any drug, chemical, or feed additive as described above and the exhibitor will forfeit all awards and sale proceeds and be subject to testing at future Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Shows. If an animal is disqualified for testing positive and/or the carcass condemned at slaughter, the disqualification will not impact class or overall placing for that species.
- 2. If a sample tests positive for illegal drug residue during the preliminary test, the parent/exhibitor has the right to request a second test to confirm the results. The second sample taken from the same animal will then be taken to a private firm for further testing. The parent/exhibitor will be responsible in advance for all costs associated with this second test. Should the results of the second test not confirm the findings in the first test, the cost of the test (minus shipping and handling) will be refunded. Knowledge of this pending information will only be made available to the Cypress- Fairbanks ISD Career and Technical Education Director and the two administrators of the Cypress- Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association Animal Drug Residue Testing Program for privacy purposes only.
- 3. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on the Show grounds, only a licensed veterinarian with the prior approval of the Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District LSA Rules Committee will be allowed to administer a drug, chemical, or feed additive. Treatment Cost: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 4. Exhibitors refusing to submit their animal/pen for drug testing will be disqualified and must remove their animal from the show grounds immediately.
- 5. Ultimate Care and Responsibility: By making entry into the Show, the exhibitor agrees and understands that ultimate care and responsibility for an animal/pen rest solely upon the exhibitor until such time that possession of the animal is turned over to the buyer and/or his agent(s).
- 6. Exhibitors are encourage to stay with their animal/pen during the hours the Exhibit Center is open. No one, other than security, will be allowed in the Exhibit Center when it is closed. CFISD LSA is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exception: Ag teachers and the staff of the CFISD CTE/LSA office may remain to conclude official business, if approved by the CTE Ag administrator.



(See also rules specific to general rules and regulations and each animal division)

1. Dates and Location

The Buyers' Luncheon will be held at Arnold Middle School on Telge Road at 11:00 a.m., Saturday, February 8, 2020. (No students with projects in the sale are allowed.)

The premium sale will be held at the Exhibit Center on Telge Road at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, February 8, 2020.

2. Attendance



Students selling projects are required to attend a **mandatory sale meeting** at 9 am on Saturday, February 8, 2020. Students who miss Saturday's meeting will be **fined \$75.00**. Students with a school-related event conflicting with this meeting must clear this with their agriscience teacher before the meeting.

Students selling projects should remain in the Exhibit Center for the duration of the premium sale.

3. Sale



Only market animals will be sold. No breeding livestock will be sold at the livestock show. Students have the option to sell their ag mechanics or horticulture projects via a silent auction process. **EXCEPTION: The grand and reserve horticulture projects are required** to sell and will be sold in the live auction, along with the grand and reserve market animals. If exhibitors are ineligible to show/sell, the sale and disposition of their animal/project is their sole responsibility. There will be no hard luck sales.

There will be NO decorations, signs, or banners on animals. They will sell as shown. Students are allowed to decorate their stalls or pens Saturday morning, but those decorations must be removed and disposed of before leaving the Exhibit Center on Saturday, February 8, 2020.

Prior to the sale, students must remove all major show tags from animals to be sold in the premium or freezer sale, including poultry.

Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show is a terminal show. All market animals will, by default, be for sale and processed to the buyers' specifications. Students desiring to keep their animals and not sell them must notify LSA admin office staff as soon after judging as possible, no later than barn closing time on Friday. At the time of notification, the student will need to pay a show fee equal to 10% of the freezer sale price or \$250 (whichever is less). The show fee must be paid with cash or money order/cashier's check. All projects not being sold must be removed from the show grounds by barn closing time on Friday, February 7, 2020. No market animal is allowed to leave the show grounds on Thursday, February 6, 2020, or Friday, February 7, 2020, without a release form. Releases will not be given until the end of the last show each day. All market animals on the show grounds Saturday, February 8, 2020, will be for sale. There are no exceptions!

Students entered in the market animal divisions should use a **pre-sale form** to indicate they already have a buyer for their animal, should it go to the freezer sale. The pre-sale will become null and void should their animal qualify for the premium sale (live auction).

Students must turn in any pre-sale forms at check-in to guarantee their buyer's purchase of the animal in the freezer sale. After that point, it is understood that LSA staff and/or sales committee members have permission to complete paperwork to sell the animal to any willing buyer. If a student acquires a prospective buyer after check-in, but before the Freezer Sale tables open (approximately 10:00 am on Saturday), they should notify the LSA staff and confirm their project has not already been sold before promising it to a buyer. Once the Freezer Sale tables open, volunteers for each campus will have the listing of sold/unsold projects. Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the student to sell their project.

Freezer sale animals will be sold for the price that has been set by the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association.

Steers \$2.50 per pound (weight set at time of weigh-in for show)

Swine \$450.00 per head Lambs \$375.00 per head Goats \$375.00 per head

Broilers \$150.00 per pen (students will deliver 5 broilers)

Turkeys \$150.00 per head

Market Rabbits \$150.00 per pen of 3

The Freezer Sale will end one (1) hour after the premium sale (live auction) or 5:00 pm, whichever is later. Any student with a Freezer Sale lamb, goat, swine, or steer not sold by the close of the Freezer Sale may have the option to sell it to one of the processors on site for floor price, put it on one of the processing trucks to be processed at the student's expense, or personally remove it from the Exhibit Center by closing time on the day of the sale.

Ag Mechanics and Horticulture projects: Students will have the option to sell their project using a silent auction process. Students must declare whether or not the project will be for sale at the time of check-in. If it will be for sale, students must be prepared to list a minimum bid at the time of check-in as well. Sales sheets will be placed with the projects upon conclusion of judging. Bids will be accepted until 4:00 pm (or 15 seconds after last bid, whichever is later) on Saturday, February 8, 2020. EXCEPTION: The grand and reserve horticulture projects are required to sell and will be sold in the live auction, along with the grand and reserve market animals.



4. Premium Sale

All grand and reserve market champions <u>and horticulture projects</u> must sell in the premium sale. A student may only sell a maximum of two projects in the premium sale on the sale date. The only exception will be if a student has more than two champions.



Up to 25%, with a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 25 animals per market division, will sell in the premium sale. The number of animals will be determined by using the number of animals that were exhibited in the show ring. When classes are posted, the official number of animals to be sold in each division will also be posted. The grand and reserve horticulture projects will also sell in the premium sale.

There will be **NO** decorations, signs, or banners on animals. They will sell as shown.

Only **one (1)** FFA member, in official dress, is allowed to be a helper on the auction block during the sale of any exhibitor's project. At the end of the premium sale, all animals must be returned to their stalls or pens.



The exhibitors of the grand and reserve champion Ag Mechanics, Breeding Heifer and Breeding Rabbit will be recognized in the arena before the start of the live auction.

5. Removal of projects/ processing

NO MARKET ANIMALS, AG MECH, OR HORTICULTURE PROJECTS MAY LEAVE WITHOUT A RELEASE FORM.

All projects sold are the responsibility of the exhibitor until the buyer takes possession of the projects or until the projects are properly delivered, according to the instructions provided to the student. It is the responsibility of the student to find out the final destination of their project(s).

All sales and buyer disposition of animals are final. Disposition of animals will be terminal. All animals in the premium auction or freezer sale will be sold and processed to the buyers' specifications.

Pre-sale buyers wanting to pick up their purchase on Thursday or Friday, must secure a release form. Releases will not be given until the end of the last show each day.

All students loading livestock on processing trailers must be present to load their own animal(s) immediately after the sale. Exception: For the safety of all involved, students/parents with swine projects will be asked to leave the swine area once all swine have been accounted for and marked for processing. Any other adjustments to load-out will be communicated to students at the show.

Students with poultry and market rabbits should wait to receive their release form before removing their project from the show grounds. Students are responsible for delivery of sold projects to the buyer.

Students with Ag Mech/Horticulture projects should wait to receive their release form before removing their project from the show grounds. Projects not for sale may be removed at the conclusion of the judging, except the Grand and Reserve Champions which will remain on display through Saturday, February 8, 2020. All projects should be removed by the time the barn closes on Saturday, February 8, 2020. Students are responsible for delivery of sold projects to the buyer. (Buyer information will be sent to the student via the ag-science teachers once the winning bidders are contacted and confirmed.)

6. Payment of students

Premium Sale Pictures: The price of two 8" x 10" pictures and (approximately \$20.00) will be deducted from every premium sale item. One of these pictures is to be delivered by the student to their buyer. The other is for the student.

There is a "Checklist for Students Upon Completion of Show" in this document outlining requirements for students. The expectation is for the requirements to be met within THIRTY (30) days of receipt of buyer information. Students will not receive payment without meeting these requirements.

Payments to students will be withheld until pledged funds are received for the purchase of the project(s) or gift(s). Any pledged funds not received may be deducted from the payment to the student.

A commission of 10% will be charged on all projects sold in the premium sale, freezer sale, silent auction, and gifts to students. The funds generated from this 10% fee will be deposited in the general account of the Livestock Show Association to cover expenses related to running the show and sale. The Cypress- Fairbanks Livestock Show Association will pay for premium buyer picture frame(s) and thank you note(s) for each exhibitor.

Cypress-Fairbanks ISD is required to issue an IRS 1099 form to students earning a total of \$600.00 or more from the sale of animals and gifts (add-ons). Please consult your tax expert with any questions about filing information on income and expenses related to raising your animal project(s).

1. Eligible Entries	While exhibitors are not required to take Ag Mechanics (at least one semester of any ag class and FFA membership qualifies them to enter), projects exhibited must have been constructed by FFA members under direct supervision of an agriscience teacher. Projects must be made available to the ag teacher(s) at any time.
	Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of two projects, either individually or group, as long as they are not in the same project class. A project can be exhibited only one time at the CFISD Livestock Show and must have been completed within one calendar year of the CFISD LSA exhibition date.
	Entry Forms — Part I/II forms and \$25 entry fee for each project are due to your agriscience teacher by Tuesday, December 10, 2019. Part I is completed per entry. Part II is completed by each exhibitor (therefore group projects will have multiple Part II forms turned in with the one Part I form).
2. Ownership	Projects may have been individually or group constructed and may be individually or chapter-owned. Groups may consist of a maximum of 5 students per project. Chapter-owned projects must be entered in the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project.
3. Check-in	Entries need to be on-site by 8:00 pm on Wednesday, February 5, 2020. Exhibitors will present project documentation and declare a minimum bid (if the item is available to be placed in the silent auction upon completion of judging).
	Project Presentation: All projects must be completed, painted, or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. Due to limited primary exhibit space, trailers and other equipment are to be displayed in transport position. Operation of ramps, extensions, and other special features may be demonstrated only as directed by official judges and as space permits. Floor covering, is not encouraged. No additional floor space will be provided for podiums, chairs, tables, show boxes, etc. Ag Mechanic projects may not be used for storage during the CFISD livestock show.
	Signs: All projects are to be identified with standard exhibitor cards supplied by the CFISD LSA. Additional signs, banners, etc. are encouraged, but in such a manner that no additional floor space is required and are subject to final approval by the Rules Committee. No "For Sale" signs will be permitted.
4. Documentation	A plan or drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction are to be provided with projects. TX DOT and/or ASAE regulations and specifications are to be provided as they apply to individual projects. Display of plans, photos, etc. must be displayed in a three-ring binder and in such a manner that no additional floor space is required. Stands, podiums, computers, etc. will be permitted only when they can be positioned on or under the project.
	Trailer Registration: Current registration plates or one trip permits and paper plates are required on all trailers that are towed to the project show. Hauled trailers will be exempt from this rule.

All three-point hitch and P.T.O. operated equipment are to meet current ASAE standards. The TX DOT web page will provide information on how to access or acquire TX DOT Equipment and Vehicle Regulations, and ASAE Standards.
	Electric Safety: All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles are to be the equipment grounding type. All metal components are to be grounded. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) shall be provided for all 120 VAC receptacles. All 50 VAC and higher connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures. Electricity will not be provided. Due to air quality factors, generators will not be allowed to operate.

General Safety: Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored or sprayed at the Telge Exhibit Center at any time. NOTE: Points alone will not determine Grand and Reserve Champion. It is the judge's decision.

There may be additional prizes awarded.

9. Sale/Removal of projects

1. Validation	All broilers will be ordered from Ideal Poultry/TAMU (through their agriscience teacher). Each student must purchase at least twenty-five (25) broilers, or in increments of twenty-five (25). Siblings may share broilers as long as they declare so on separate entry forms and each purchase at least twenty-five (25) broilers (total of fifty-50). Students must raise broilers at their own home, unless prior arrangements have been made with the agriscience teacher. All broilers will be wing-banded at time of pick-up. Exhibitors must declare ownership of their doe(s)/buck(s) on a Breeding Rabbit Entry form by October 8, 2019 to be eligible to enter the market rabbit division. Only offspring from these doe(s) and buck(s) will be eligible for the meat pen. Siblings may share rabbits as long as they declare so on separate entry forms. Market rabbit entry forms are due by Tuesday, December 10, 2019. All market rabbits must be validated and receive a CFISD validation tattoo at the CFISD Exhibit Center on Telge Road. The validation tattoo is in addition to the individual tattoo that should be in the left ear and legible BEFORE arrival at the validation. A pen will consist of three (3) rabbits, either sex, of the same breed and variety, not over 10 weeks old, and must weigh 3.5 – 5.5 pounds. Only five (5) market rabbits can be brought to the Exhibit Center. No market rabbits will be permitted in pens prior to going through the sift. Three (3) market rabbits will be selected for exhibit. Any alternate rabbits are considered sifted and will be removed from the show grounds upon completion of sifting.

Sifting New for 2019-20	A sifting committee will be appointed to <u>inspect all entries upon arrival at the show grounds on Wednesday, February 5, 2020.</u> Rabbits will be sifted according to ARBA Meat Type Guidelines. All decisions of the official sifting committee are final and cannot be protested. Sifted and alternate rabbits must be removed from the show grounds and are not eligible for the freezer sale.
4. Care	Each exhibitor is responsible for providing feed, water, and containers for his/her rabbits at all times. Students may bring a small battery-operated fan and/or ice (made from water only, no chemicals). There will be no unethical treatment of rabbits.
5. Showing	Exhibitors must place their rabbits in the cages to be presented for judging. ARBA rules will be followed for the judging of all meat pens.
6. Placing	Following completion of judging, market rabbits will be placed in the sale order. Up to 25% of the total market rabbits shown, with a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 25 market rabbits, will sell in the premium sale.
7. Processing	The processing of the rabbits is the responsibility of the student. Market rabbits must be processed within 7 days, unless buyer requests live delivery, and delivered within 21 days after the sale. There are no exceptions!
8. Testing	Every exhibitor must agree to submit their market rabbit for drug residue testing at any time after check-in. The Association reserves the right to perform any test, including but not limited to tissue, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis, on the grand and reserve champions, along with a random group of animals from this division (see Drug Residue Rules for more details).

1. Purpose/Date of Event

The purpose of this event is to select individuals who are most representative of CFISD FFA that possess outstanding attributes of personality, intelligence, knowledge and goodwill. The CFISD Livestock Show Royalty shall attend and participate in various functions of the 2019 CFISD Livestock Show throughout their reign, and support the CFISD Show when asked for assistance. They shall promote the principles of the CFISD Livestock Show in all their endeavors.

The Contest will be held on December 7, 2019 at Cypress Falls High School.

2. Contest Awards

CFISD Show Queen – scholarship worth 20% of ALL sponsorship monies, belt buckle, and sash (* Runner-up will receive a garment bag.)

CFISD Show King – scholarship worth 20% of ALL sponsorship monies belt buckle, and belt (* Runner-up will receive a garment bag.)



CFISD Miss Show Teen – credit towards LSA-facilitated purchase of project and pen rent to be entered in 2020 CFISD Livestock Show worth 20% of ALL sponsorship monies, belt buckle, and sash (*Runner-up will receive a duffle bag.)

CFISD Mr. Show Teen - credit towards LSA-facilitated purchase of project and pen rent to be entered in 2020 CFISD Livestock Show worth 20% of ALL sponsorship monies, belt buckle, and belt (*Runner-up will receive a duffle bag.)

- ** CFISD Top Hand credit towards LSA-facilitated purchase of project and pen rent to be entered in 2020 CFISD Livestock Show (if in grades 9-11) or cholarship (if in grade 12) worth 10% of ALL sponsorship monies, and belt buckle
- * In the event the CFISD Rules Committee determines the winner has not fulfilled their duties, the runner-up will assume the title and will receive all awards related to that title.
- ** Contestants cannot win multiple scholarships, animal credits, or belt buckles. Should a contestant win their royalty category and Top Hand, they will forfeit the Top Hand awards. Instead, the Top Hand awards will go to the contestant with the next highest sponsorship total.

Awards are non-transferable.

3. Eligibility

Participants must be enrolled in a CFISD high school as of October 1, 2019. Students must have at least a semester of ag in their 2019-2020 schedule of classes, be in good standing with their FFA chapter, and must be academically eligible to compete in the contest. Should a winner become ineligible at the time of the CFISD Livestock show, all gifts and awards will be forfeited to the CFISD Livestock Show Association.

* Previous winners of the Miss Show Teen or Mr. Show Teen are not eligible to compete in those categories again, although they are eligible to compete for Show Queen or Show King when they become 12th graders.

4. Entry Requirements

To enter the contest, students must submit all of the following –

Entry form (notarized)

\$25 Entry fee

Sponsor forms/Funds (totaling at least \$100)

Deadline for completed entries is November 12, 2019. Entries must be postmarked for mail delivery to the CFISD LSA Office (attention Denise Kubecka, 10300 Jones Rd #664, Houston, TX 77065) and/or delivered to your agriscience teacher by this date.

Sponsor thank you notes are due at contest check-in.

5. Sponsorships

Each contestant is required to collect and turn in at least \$100 in sponsorships by the entry deadline to compete in the contest.

Sponsors donating \$100 or more will be recognized at the contest and in the CFISD LSA Show Book. If a sponsor gives multiple donations to one or more contestants, those donations will be combined to determine their sponsorship level.

Sponsorship levels are as follows:

Diamond \$750 sponsorship
Platinum \$500 sponsorship
Gold \$300 sponsorship
Silver \$200 sponsorship
Bronze \$100 sponsorship

Completed sponsorship forms are to be completed and turned in with the donations. Be sure to include the address of the donors so receipts can be mailed.

6. Scoring

The CFISD Livestock Show Royalty will be the individuals with the highest combined score from the following areas:

Personal Interview (33 points maximum)

- Contestants will be interviewed privately by a panel of judges.



Thought Questions (33 points maximum)

- Contestants will draw and respond to a prepared thought question. <u>The questions will be created by a group of ag teachers.</u>
Contestants will be scored on appearance (dress), presentation, intelligence and personality. Contestants should refrain from forced promenade, sauntering, and excessive hand gesturing.

General Livestock / FFA Knowledge Test (33 points maximum)

- The test will consist of multiple choice questions based on general livestock and FFA knowledge.

A study guide will be emailed to the address provided on the entry form. It will also be available on the CFISD LSA website.

CFISD Top Hand will be the contestant, from any category, that raised the most money in sponsorships by the deadline.

All judges are instructed to judge on the capability of contestants according to age. All judges' decisions are final and will NOT be up for review by anyone. Should a tie arise, the tie will be broken with the test score. The contestant with the higher test score will win the contest. If a tie still exists after examining the test score, it will be broken by the interview score. If both the test and interview scores are a tie, it will be broken by the judges.

7. Contest Procedures

Attire for contest is FFA official dress as outlined in the Official FFA Manual.

Check-in begins at 7:00 am. At that time, students should <u>turn in their stamped/addressed thank you notes</u> to their sponsors. DO NOT SEAL the envelopes. Envelopes that are missing the stamp or address will not be accepted.

Students will **draw for interview** positions at 7:30 am. Should a student's name be called and the student is not present to draw, he/ she will be disqualified from the contest.

Interviews/testing will begin at 8:00 am. Interviews will take place in the order determined by the draw. When not being interviewed, contestants will complete the test over general livestock/FFA knowledge. All testing must be completed by the time the last interview is completed. Contestants will be sequestered during this time.

There will be about a **30-minute break** after interviews/testing, to allow those scores to be calculated and to give the contestants a lunch/snack break. No concessions are available and contestants are not to leave the competition site. They may **bring a lunch/snack** or someone can bring it to them during this time.

After the break, the **thought question portion** will begin. Prepared and thought questions that occur on the runway walk will be scored on stage during this segment of the contest.

Royal Contest winners will be announced after a break to tally scores.

8. Collecting Awards

Winners of scholarships will provide documentation, to the CFISD LSA office, of enrollment at a post-secondary institution within 8 months of graduation. At that time, a check in the amount of the scholarship award will be cut to the institution. Winners of credit towards a CFISD LSA project, must redeem the credit in the school year following receipt of the award. Any unclaimed awards will be forfeited.

NOTE: Should the CFISD Livestock Show Association Rules Committee determine a winner has not or cannot fulfill the duties associated with their title, they must relinquish their title to the runner-up of the category.

1. Validation	Exhibitors may show only steers purchased through the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Livestock Show Association. All market steers, entered and eligible to show, must be on feed and under the daily care of the exhibitor from selection day forward. The exhibitor must allow an initial DNA hair sample to be collected ((see #5 in General Rules for more details). Exhibitors must notify their agriscience teacher within 24 hours if an ear tag falls off during the time they own the animal. Exhibitors may only show one (1) steer.
2. Care/Grooming:	The steer show will be a SLICK show. Prior to arrival at the show, steers will be pre-clipped to no more than ½" of hair on any part of the body, except the suspended tail, which may be ratted and balled or may be bobbed off. Unethical treatment and/or fitting is prohibited and includes, but is not limited to: • any alteration of the animal's natural color pattern by painting or applying of any hair changing product; • addition of any dust or hair-like substance, including false tail heads, false tail switches, or false polls; • the cutting, tearing, or gluing of the hide (or underneath the hide) or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal; or • the injection of any natural or synthetic air, gas, solid, or liquid under the hide to alter the normal confirmation. No tubing of liquids is allowed. The steer show is a slick shorn show only. Washing with shampoo and conditioning products, combing, brushing, and blow drying are the only grooming activities allowed.
3. Weigh-in	Ear tags will be read on steers at weigh-in. Eligibility of animals arriving missing an ear tag or with an ear tag number that does not coincide with LSA records will be determined by the LSA Rules Committee. Steers in this market division will be weighed in one time only on Wednesday, February 5, 2020 and this will be the animal's official weight. Entries will be divided into weight classes after weigh-in.
4. Sifting	Steers will be sifted on health and hair length by the sifter on Wednesday, February 5, 2020. All discrepancies on hair length will be handled by the sifter(s) with a ¾" comb. All exhibitors or substitute exhibitors (selected/approved by their Agriscience teacher based on general rules and regulations) must lead their steer during the sifting and judging process. Exhibitors will have one opportunity to correct any hair issues off-site if sifted, up to the end of check-in.

Following selection of the champions, the judge will select the rest of the sale order, starting with the remaining class winners (meaning the top steer from each weight class will be placed in the sale before remaining steers placing 2nd and higher are placed). Up to 25% of the total steers shown, with a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 25 steers, will sell in the premium sale.
9. Showmanship	Showmanship class will follow the sale order. Only the owner of the animal can compete for showmanship.

Students must raise turkeys at their own home, unless prior arrangements have been made with the agriscience teacher. All turkeys will be wing-banded at time of pick-up.
